Mr. Kaustubh Kadam, a final year BSc student from Zoology department, was selected as a student representative in committee for framing TYBSc Zoology syllabus of academic year 2018-19.

Faculty members participated in syllabus workshops conducted by the BOS and provide their suggestion contributing to the framing of syllabus.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

In the beginning of the academic year, faculty members prepare lesson plans, maintain teacher’s personal diary for recording lessons and day-to-day activities, and conduct bridge courses in their respective subject.

Along with traditional methods of teaching like Chalk & Blackboard and lecture, the faculty members use modern and versatile teaching methods to make the learning experience more joyful and enriching. These include use of scenario based learning, audio clips, Z to A method, role play, films, documentaries, charts and cards, virtual laboratories, peer teaching etc.

Innovative concept of Nutrition Buddies, Health and Hygiene Buddies, Environment Buddies, Motivation Buddies has been used by Department of Psychology to make teaching more interactive.

Departments also organize seminars, workshops, industrial visits, projects, guest lectures, industrial / field visits for students to enhance the teaching-learning.

Remedial coaching is given to the students with poor academic performance. In addition, extra coaching is also given to students participating in NCC, NSS, Sports, Drama and other extra-curricular activities for the college.

The college conducts library orientation program to introduce students to the various resources and digital facilities for inculcating self learning.

The college supplements the teaching and learning by extending support services including free access to internet, and use of LCD, OHP, Visualizers, and Smart boards to enhance the curriculum as a means to compete in global market.

Teachers are rated by students on a 5-point Teachers Assessment Rating Scale (TARS). The data is analysed and the feedback is given to the respective teachers by the Principal / Vice-Principal / HOD.

Parents-Teachers Association (PTA) meetings are organized to update the parents about the progress of their wards and to gather feedback and suggestions from the Parents.

Suggestions and feedbacks from Student Council members are also taken into consideration and implemented wherever required.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Examination and evaluation work is carried out according to the guidelines of the University of Mumbai.

Teachers prepared question banks and model answers and shared the same with the students. Practice tests were conducted to prepare students for their semester exam.

Regular class tests were conducted.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The institute supports initiatives to inculcate research aptitude among students.

Faculty members were encouraged to submit research project to various funding agencies, attend seminars and conferences for presenting their research papers, and publish papers in reputed refereed international / national journals.

Minor Research projects were completed by the faculty members of Commerce and Chemistry Departments.

Two faculty members from Dept of Political Sc. & History were awarded Ph.D. Degree.

Faculty members from Marathi, English, Chemistry and Commerce are pursuing PhD.

Faculty members from the Marathi, English, Zoology, Chemistry and Commerce departments are recognized guides for Ph.D. in the University of Mumbai.

Final year students of Zoology department completed research projects as part of their curriculum.

The postgraduate students of Chemistry department completed research project.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Library has subscription for UGC N-LIST. Students and teachers are provided these facilities through their personal login.

Library website provides information such as updated syllabus, list of periodical, and links to access E-resources and other important sites.

Some of the departments maintain departmental library and 'Best Reader' award is given to students.

New instruments were purchased by Zoology department for the UG and PG practical such as, Gel Casting trays for electrophoresis (01) and automatic sieve shaker machine (01). LCD projectors (02) were installed in the classrooms for Computer Science department.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Teachers are encouraged to participate in orientation programs, refresher courses and short-term training conducted by the UGC-HRDCs, and also attend seminars, workshops and conferences.

Two Days inter-collegiate Cultural Fest "Utsav-MD" was organised by non-teaching staff

Staff Academy conducted interactive session and guest lecture for teaching staff.

Faculty members from the Statistics and Chemistry departments conducted one day workshops on basic statistics and basic chemistry for the PG students of Zoology department.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Vacancies are filled as per the UGC norms as and when required for aided and unaided/self-financed Sections.

Two teachers were appointed on CHB in Zoology department.

One teacher was appointed on CHB in Botany department.

One full time teaching faculty and one lab assistant was appointed in the Computer Science department.

Experts from industrial/corporate sectors are invited as visiting faculties and Guest lecturers.

Many departments organized industrial visits for their students such as, visit to film division by BMM.

Psychology Department collaborated with experts from various sectors and invited them as guest lecturers including Gynaecologists, Psychiatrists, Nutrition experts, Financial experts, health and hygiene experts, Environment Conservation professionals.



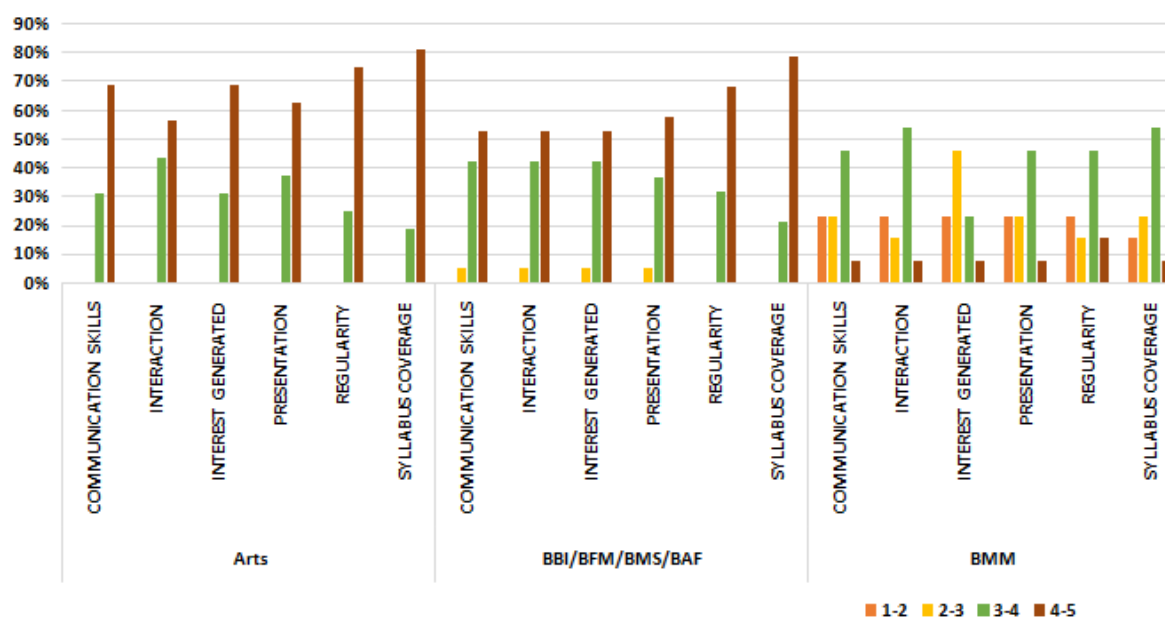

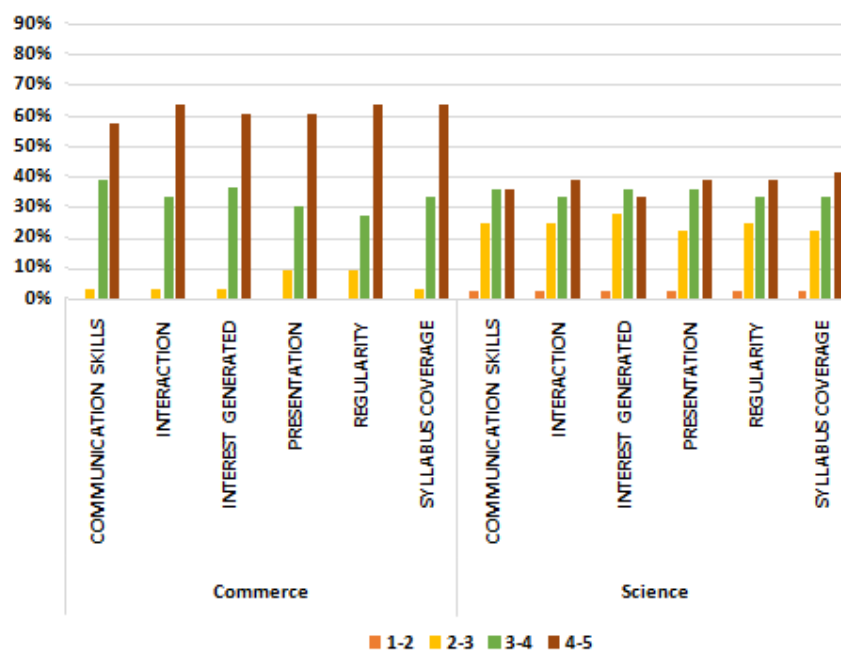
